FIVE WEEKLY PANELS TO TAKE PLACE APRIL 29 THROUGH MAY 27 WITH FOCUS ON DIVERSE STORYTELLING

NEW YORK, NY (April 8, 2021): New York International Children's Film Festival is once again bringing filmmakers, industry leaders, and artists together to share projects and discuss key issues around representation in entertainment for kids. The series will take place virtually over five Thursdays from April 29 through May 27 and is a no-fee event.

The 2021 forum will place particular emphasis on the importance of diverse representation both on and behind the camera and in all aspects of entertainment for young audiences, from development to marketing and beyond. The Festival has long been at the forefront of the call for dynamic and diverse programming for kids and families and recognizes the significant impact the content they consume can have on their understanding of the world around them.

In addition to the Festival's annual slate of short and feature films from around the world, special programs such as *Breaking the Binary*, *Celebrating Black Stories*, and *Girls' POV* have successfully amplified often underrepresented voices and stories. The Industry Forum initiative, launched in 2020, is an outgrowth of the organization's ongoing commitment to ensuring thought-provoking and intelligent stories are available to all audiences.

"We've long been aware of the necessity for young people to see themselves reflected in the media they consume and the authenticity reflected in the work of creative teams with wide-ranging backgrounds and viewpoints," said Executive Director Nina Guralnick. "After the events of the past year, we are once again proud to offer a platform for thought-provoking discussion and actionable ideas."

An offshoot of the Festival's mission to foster a more diverse and authentic world for kids on screen, the Industry Forum is designed to jumpstart conversations among artists, filmmakers and professionals behind the scenes. Industry veterans, executives, film students, and academics from around the world join panels and presentations to discuss how to create a more inclusive and equitable industry for children's media and entertainment. New York International Children's Film Festival (NYICFF) is a year-round nonprofit arts organization dedicated to building a dynamic film culture for families and classrooms. Now in its 23rd year, NYICFF delivers impactful programming to children, students, families, educators, filmmakers and media arts professionals through its four core activities: its annual, Oscar®-qualifying NYC film festival; its city-wide media arts and literacy program, Film-Ed; national screening program NYICFF Kid Flicks, serving major regional cultural institutions, cinemas, and museums; and its Industry Forum, bringing together professionals at all stages of their careers to discuss actionable ideas that foster a more equitable and inclusive community both on screen and behind the scenes.

The 2021 Festival took place virtually from March 5-14, drawing viewers from 47 states across the country to over 100 short and feature films, sneak peeks, and filmmaker Q&As from around the world. The rich and dynamic film program—selected from over 1,500 international submissions—provided an opportunity for young audiences around the country to both connect with stories different from their own and to see themselves reflected on screen.
